Shi speaks to Rotary on 'Vision 2025'

Furman president and fellow Rotarian David Shi told Rotarians that changes coming to the Greenville area must be controlled to prevent being "swept up in changes we didn't control."

Reporting on the progress of "Vision 2025," Shi said it is projected that the population of Greenville will total approximately half a million in the next two decades.

In addition to a "rapidly aging population," the Furman president said Greenville is becoming more ethnically and globally diverse. Shi described Greenville's "international flavor" as a distinctive to be celebrated. He was optimistic about Greenville's future, citing its "can do" spirit.
