



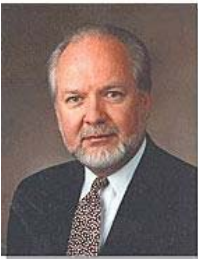

OCTOBER 26 SPEAKER—DR. JOHN C. STOCKWELL



Dr. John C. Stockwell

Dr. John C. Stockwell has served as chancellor of the University of South Carolina Upstate since 1994, where he seeks to fulfill the University’s vision of distinguishing itself as the metropolitan university of South Carolina and one of the leading metropolitan universities in the Southeast.

Under his leadership, the University has experienced a tremendous amount of growth in enrollment, campus development, program offerings and public/private partnerships. Growth has been steady and dramatic over the past eight years. Since Fall 1995, enrollments have increased by 45% with 4,500+ students expected to enroll in the Fall 2004. The campus boasts a diverse student population with 71 nations represented among the student body and a minority enrollment of more than 30%.

Before coming to USCS, Dr. Stockwell served as provost, vice-chancellor and interim chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Parkside. In earlier years, he served as dean of the School of Arts and Sciences at the State University of New York (Cortland), as chair and professor of the Department of Speech and Theatre at Indiana State University and as professor and director of theatre at California State University Northridge.
