Judith S. Prince is the 98th president of the Rotary Club of Greenville. She is passionate about education, leadership, and diversity—all Rotary core values. She has served the University of South Carolina Upstate for 33 years in various roles, including Director of Graduate Regional Studies, Assistant Dean for Graduate and Special Programs, Associate Professor, Associate Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, and Interim Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs. For the last ten years, she has been Vice Chancellor for the USC Upstate Greenville Campus. She now works with USC Upstate helping to make college degrees more accessible to working adults in Greenville.

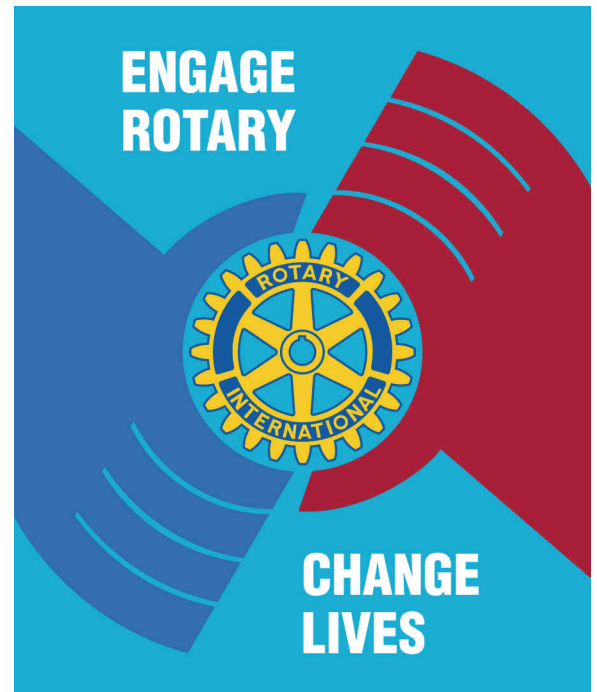
Judith has been active in the Greenville Community, serving on numerous boards, including Upstate International, Urban League of the Upstate, MLK Dream Weekend Diversity Committee, Vision 2025 Education Task Force, and more. She was a member of Class 30 of Leadership Greenville, and she participated in the Upstate Diversity Leadership Academy. Awards she has received for her work include the Leadership Greenville Alumni of the Year Award, the Amy K. Stubbs Woman of Achievement in Education Award, Woman Making History Award, one of Greenville's 50 Most Influential from Greenville Business Magazine, and the ATHENA Award from Greenville Chamber of Commerce. For her work in diversity, she received the 2011 Calder Ehrmann Individual Award for Excellence in Diversity from the Riley Institute Diversity Leaders Initiative, and the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education Distinguished Service Award for support of excellence and equity in higher education.

Prince also received the Martha Kime Piper Award for academic leadership, the highest award to a woman in higher education in South Carolina, and the Higher Education Award from the South Carolina Association of Superintendents for contributions to public education (K-12) in South Carolina.

Dr. Prince enjoys classical music, educational travel, and writing op-eds for The Greenville News on education, leadership, diversity, and other topics.
