Richard W. Riley is the former U. S. Secretary of Education (1993-2001) and former Governor of South Carolina (1979-1987). He currently is a senior partner in the law firm of Nelson Mullins Riley & Scarborough LLP, with more than 400 attorneys in offices throughout South Carolina and North Carolina, as well as in Atlanta, Boston, Nashville, Tallahassee, Huntington (WV), and Washington, D.C. Secretary Riley counsels clients and works with partners to develop strategy on complex business, governance, financial and legal matters for local, national and international clients. Secretary Riley also is Senior Partner in the firm's affiliate, Education Counsel, which specializes in education advocacy, policy, strategy and law.

With the full support of the firm, Secretary Riley remains an ambassador for improving education in the United States and abroad. He serves as Advisory Board Chair of the Richard W. Riley Institute of Government, Politics and Public Leadership at his alma mater, Furman University. He also has been named Distinguished Professor at the University of South Carolina, and the College of Education at Winthrop University bears his name, as does the College of Education and Leadership at Walden University. In addition, he speaks, provides leadership and serves in an advisory and collaborative capacity with many other entities across the nation and abroad that support education improvement at all levels

Secretary Riley earned his bachelor's degree, cum laude, in political science from Furman University and his J.D. from the University of South Carolina School of Law. He is the recipient of honorary degrees from universities and colleges in the United States and abroad, as well as numerous education and other public service awards. In 2009, TIME Magazine named him one of America's Top 10 Best Cabinet Members in our nation's history. In 2010, he was inducted into the South Carolina Hall of Fame.

Secretary Riley and his wife, Ann "Tunky" Yarborough Riley (now deceased), have four children and 14 grandchildren.


So, here's the deal.

As District Chair for Polio Plus, I am writing for your input on an idea to celebrate World Polio Day on October 24, 2014. I would appreciate a response as soon as possible so that plans can go forward if the event is worthwhile.

The event under consideration is a trip to Warm Springs, GA. As you may or may not know, Warm Springs is where Pres. Franklin Delano Roosevelt received rehab treatment for Polio – as well as many other Polio patients. He built the Little White House in 1932 when Gov. of New York – a year before becoming President of the United States. He swam in the 80+ degree warm spring waters and received some relief for his Polio stricken hips and legs, and brought national attention to Warm Springs. Today Warm Springs is still operating as a rehab center for persons with disabilities.

#### Please present this to your club and reply whether or not there is an interest in going to Warm Springs.

WHAT: Trip to the Little White House – originally known for treatment of Polio victims

WHEN: Friday, Oct. 24<sup>th</sup>.

WHERE: Warm Springs, GA (approx. 3 hours from Anderson)

WHY: Celebrate World Polio Day – a **family** affair HOW: Charter Bus (if enough interest) – or car pool

COST: Tickets: \$12 adults; \$10 (seniors/62+); \$7 (6-17 years olds) and \$2 (under 6 years) Meal and share of transportation
