A Message from the President

Our Commitment to Literacy



Suppose you wake up in the morning, go to the bathroom and open the medicine cabinet to discover that you can't read any of the labels on the medicine bottles. Medicine that you need to take. The words are just a jumble of letters ... like a foreign language. You need to take the bus downtown to apply for a job but you can't read the destination in the window on the front of the bus. You can't apply for a job anyway because you can't read or write well enough to fill out the job application. You are one of 13% of the population in the Upcountry of South Carolina who are functionally illiterate. Research by the International Reading Association shows that illiteracy keeps people in poverty. Annual health-care costs in the United States are four times higher for illiterate people than literate ones. And most important, children of illiterate parents have more trouble in school.

For fifty years, the Greenville Literacy Association has provided opportunities for adults of all income and literacy levels to achieve self-sufficiency through education. The program serves a wide range of education levels, from basic reading and math skills to high school equivalency tests for GED and TASC certification. The Greenville Literacy Association is committed to making Greenville the kind of community where all adults have the skills to earn a living wage and support their families.

The Rotary Club of Greenville has been a close partner in this effort for over many years. In 2004 the Rotary Club headed an effort that resulted in the creation of the Rotary Family Literacy Center located at the YWCA. Unfortunately both the YWCA and the Rotary Family Literacy Center are gone but Rotary's commitment to literacy is stronger than ever. Our past president, Judith Prince, serves on the Board of Directors of the Greenville Literacy Association and Lynn Mann is the new chair of our Literacy Service Project. From last year's Rotary Partnership for Literacy Funds, a communications board is up in the lobby of the Greenville Literacy Association; a Smart Board is up in one of their largest classrooms; scholarships to take the GED have been awarded and the newest Rotary logo is on all envelopes being mailed from the Greenville Literacy Association. Literacy will also be the major project for our upcoming Centennial celebration. We will sponsor a classroom renovation at the Greenville Literacy Association at McAlister Square as well as, student tuition support for the "Career Pathways" pilot program.

In order to continue this important partnership, we need the involvement and support of our membership. In addition to getting involved with the Club's Literacy committee, the Greenville Literacy Association needs volunteers to serve as tutors and volunteers to help with "The Really Good, Really Big, Really Cheap Book Sale" which will be August 14 through August 16, 2015. With over 130 categories and 125,000 books for sale, there will be a significant need for volunteer help. There will be a preview party on Friday August 14, from 5:30pm until 8:00pm and you can purchase tickets online at www.greenvilleliteracy.org/book-sale


