It's Time for an Outing!





Casey Stevenson - 2015 Rotary Service Above Self Scholar



Putting others' needs ahead of his own seems to come second nature to Casey Stevenson. Jean Shew, a health room attendant at Greenville Tech Charter High School (GTCHS), witnessed many examples of that happening when Stevenson was a student there. Stevenson, now a freshman at Presbyterian College, was often the one behind the scenes at the high school, making things happen, Shew said. As a member of the Beta Club, for example, he organized students for the club trips, set up the club website, as well as, the sound system and special lighting for their school dances. "Any club that he starts or joins will be improved by him. He changes the culture to a more positive one no matter where he goes," she said.

But Stevenson is not the type to blow his own horn, she said. He would not be the one standing up and making a speech. "He's the one who hears 'we need help' and then makes it happen," Shew said. "He's s good student who is always encouraging, upbeat, and a friend to many." Shew was pleased, but not surprised to learn that Stevenson had been selected as the 2015 Rotary Service <u>Above Self</u> Scholar, awarded by the Rotary Club of Greenville.

"It just affirmed what a great student he is," she said. "He totally puts service above self." Rotarians selected Stevenson for the award partly due to "the level of leadership and service he has already demonstrated in his life" and because he "leads by example of service." Stevenson said he is following an example set for him by his parents.

The native of West Virginia who moved to Greenville eight years ago, remembers growing up in a small town with the kind of parents who, if they knew someone who was down on their luck, would take them into their home until they could get back on their feet. "They taught me that if I could help someone, there's no point in not helping them," Stevenson told *The Greenville News*. "So, if I can help in any way, I'm willing to do so. I think it comes down to something I enjoy."

As a high school student, Stevenson got joy out of serving as the president of the Beta Club and the National Honor Society, the drama club and the school's book club, which he founded. Also while at GTCH, Stevenson created and founded the "Little Big School," a student-led tutoring and mentorship program that pairs older students with younger students, with a specific focus on Title 1 elementary schools. He launched the program at Monaview Elementary, having mobilized teams of other students from GTCHS to also serve as mentors and tutors. The list of projects he organized during high school also includes his volunteering to develop and manage the school's website. "I kind of wandered around and did what I could," he said. "I like to stay busy." Stevenson graduated from GTCH with a 4.7 GPA, having already achieved approximately one year of college credits.

The school nurse had informed him about the Rotary Club scholarship, he said. "They told me it was titled, 'Service Above Self' and that just happened to be something I really enjoy, community service, so I applied," he said. The scholarship, he said, "made the difference between going into a huge amount of debt for college and not so much debt for college."

The Service Above Self scholarships are a renewable grant of up to \$5,000 per year for four years for a total potential award of \$20,000, according to the Rotary Club of Greenville web site. It is given to a Greenville County graduating high school senior with exceptional community service and academic performance, the site said.

Stevenson is majoring in pharmacy at Presbyterian College, but desires to retire as an elementary school science teacher. He knew that he would enjoy being a teacher and working with children after taking a teacher cadet class. He also knew he'd enjoy Rotary after going to the meetings and meeting the likes of Judy Prince and Grady Patterson, his mentor.

"I've met a lot of great people through them," he said. And like himself, "it seems they'd help anyone in any way," Stevenson said.
