WED, APR. 13, 2016 | 9AM-5PM YOUNTS CONFERENCE CENTER AT FURMAN

The Peace Seminar celebrates the Centennial of the Rotary Club of Greenville in conjunction with the World Religions Symposium at Furman University and discusses questions such as the following: Is peace possible? Do religions create peace or conflicts? What can individuals do to create peace? Presentations include: "Challenges and Prospects for Peace" "Religious Perspectives on Peace and Conflict Resolution," and the meaning of the Holocaust in a world torn by ethnic conflict. Religion and spirituality will be examined. During an interactive play, participants in the seminar will be called upon to actively present solutions to issues and conflicts in preparation for service as reconciling agents in our communities.



BAWA JAIN – Bawa Jain is the Founding Secretary General of the World Council of Religious Leaders (WCORL). Prior to that, Jain was Chairman of the Millennium World Peace Summit of Religious and Spiritual Leaders which brought over 2000 of the world's preeminent religious leaders to the United Nations in 2000. WCORL seeks to reduce religiously motivated conflicts. Mr. Jain coined the term Religious Diplomacy, actively speaks, practices and promotes it around the World as part of his broader thrust on Responsible Leadership.



NORBERT BIKALES, Ph.D. AND GERDA BIKALES – Since retirement, Dr. Norbert Bikales, a well-hown polymer chemist, and Gerda Bikales, an accomplished writer and speaker, have been very active in Holocaust education. Dr. Bikales lost his parents and many family members to the Holocaust. Gerda's wartime memoir, *Through the* Volkey of the Shodow of Death: A Holocaust Childhood, vividly brings to life her dangerous journey through Nazi-ocupied Europe.



KEN MORGAN – Ken Morgan is Past Director of Rotary International, 2004-2006. He served as Moderator for the 2008 International Assembly, and Chairman of the 2007 International Institute that preceded the Convention in Salt Lake City. He served two years as the Board representative on the International PolioPlus Committee and as chairman of the Board Audit Committee. Ken served as Vice Chair of the Rotary Peace Center Committee from 2008-2010 and has been involved with the Duke/UNC Peace Center since its inception in 2000.



VINOD DESHMUKH, M.D., Ph.D. – Dr. Deshmukh retired from private practice of neurology at Flagler Hospital in St. Augustine, Florida in 2007. He was Associate Professor of Neurology at the University of Florida. He has published over stdy scientific articles including a monograph on Brain Blood Flow. Dr. Deshmukh will speak about spirituality as a path for conflict resolution. He believes spirituality creates a sense of oneness and human unity.



APPLIED THEATRE CENTER WITH DR. DALE SAVIDGE, Ph.D. – Applied Theatre Center in Greenville situalates creative thinking, intercultural competencies, and other skills needed for the 21st century, and creates opportunities for active learning, the most effective way to learn. Dr. Dale Savidge is the Executive Director of the Applied Theatre Center, and he is Professor in the Department of Theatre at North Greenville University where he teaches applied Theatre. Under his leadership, the Applied Theatre Center will present an interactive play during which participants in the seminar can actively resolve conflicts.

Roper Mountain Holiday Lights. This exhibit is an important part of our legacy and you don't want to miss it.


The Peace and Conflict Resolution Seminar is part of our Centennial celebration and it's a full-day event held on April 13 at Furman University's Younts Center. This will be a powerful discussion concerning the question of whether world peace is possible and how it can be achieved. Our Rotary club will host this Seminar as part of the World Religions Symposium at Furman University. A group of highly respected presenters will be on hand to deal with issues like; is peace possible? Do religions create peace or conflicts? What can individuals do to deal with conflict? Bawa Jain, Founding Secretary General of the World Council of Religious Leaders, Ken Morgan, former Vice Chair of the Rotary Peace Center Committee, Norbert and Gerda Bikales, Holocaust Survivors, and a panel of religious leaders will explore these questions and more. The Applied Theater Center will conduct an interactive exercise that will examine how we as individuals can help resolve conflict. This is an important and timely event that will be a keystone to our Centennial celebration and will provide a meaningful beginning to our next 100 years. Admission is free to Rotary club members and the lunch will count as our regular luncheon.

The Rotary Centennial Cup is the annual golf tournament and this year it will be considerably bigger and better. It will be held on June 20, 2016 at Green Valley Country Club. You will be receiving more information about this event at a later date.




