The Greenville County Museum of Art has been an important part of the fabric of Greenville's arts community for decades. Two representatives from GCMA will be at our next meeting to discuss the museum's extensive Andrew Wyeth collection and the Wyeth Dynasty exhibition currently available for viewing through September 10, 2017.

Andrew Wyeth (1917 - 2009), regarded as one of the most important American artists of the 20th century, launched his career in 1937 with a sold-out exhibition of his watercolors in New York.

In celebration of the centennial of his birth, the Greenville County Museum of Art presents the exhibition Wyeth Dynasty, a retrospective not only of Andrew Wyeth's work, but also a glimpse into the work of his father, N. C., his son Jamie and his sisters Carolyn and Henriette. More than 70 works are featured in this important look at the first family of American painting. The exhibition also includes a number of sketches and studies that complement and enrich the finished watercolors and temperas.

The Museum's collection emphasizes Wyeth's preference for painting intimate subjects, including his family, his homes, his memories, and his favorite models. He once said, "I am an illustrator of my own life."

Greenville's Andrew Wyeth collection encompasses the full scope of the artist's extraordinary career, including significant decade-by-decade examples, from the 1930s to the 21st century. Wyeth himself described it as "the very best collection of my watercolors in any public museum in this country."

Fall Outing Fellowship and Fun


You've experienced top notch Rotary luncheons. You've experienced the solar eclipse. Now experience the 2017 Rotary Fall Outing!

Fundraising Committee: Concentrated commitment from now until November 1. Limited engagement from November 1 through February 28, 2018. We need two people to fill this committee.


Display Committee: Concentrated weekend commitment from September 1 through November 22 and from January 2 through February 28, 2018. We need four people to fill this committee.
