Larry DandridgeAuthor, Blades of Thunder

Larry Dandridge is the CEO, Editor, and a Senior Writer with Tigers, Vikings, and Vipers Publishing, LLC. His latest military history and action book includes 416 pages of edge-of-your-seat reading and 46 combat pictures. BLADES OF THUNDER (BOOK ONE), is an all five-star reviewed, action-packed, informative, fast selling, and non-fiction account of the US Helicopter War in Vietnam in 1968 and 1969. Four of the main characters in the book are SC heroes and ex-Army Aviators.

Larry also played in ARMY WIVES as Corporal Arnold Sedowski, a Vietnam War Veteran, and he is a member of the Screen Actors Guild.

LTC (Retired) Larry Dandridge is an ex-enlisted Army infantryman, aviation warrant officer aviator, and retired aviation commissioned officer. He served as an Army flight instructor, flight examiner, flight commander, maintenance test pilot, US-German negotiator, locomotive operator, procurement

official, and logistician in the US Army for 24 years. Larry was severely wounded in Vietnam in 1969 flying an attack helicopter.

His military awards include the Legion of Merit, Purple Heart, Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry, German Silver Cross, the Joint Meritorious Service Medal, five Meritorious Service Medals, 15 Combat Air Medals, and two Silver Quill Awards to mention a few.

He is also the past president of the Association of the US Army (AUSA) Charleston, SC Chapter and the current VP for Veteran Affairs. He has led many efforts to help our military men and women, veterans, and their families to find jobs, obtain housing, and much more.

Today, between writing books, Larry is a volunteer Patient Advisor, Veterans Service Officer, and Employment Assistance Officer at the Ralph H. Johnson VA Medical Center where he teaches Patient and Family Centered Care (PFCC). He also serves on the Customer Service Council, the Directors Veterans Service Officer (VSO) Council, and several other VA advisory councils at his local VA hospital.

Larry is married and has five children and nine grandchildren and a miniature Italian Greyhound. He likes to read, write, act, play tennis and pickle ball, fish, walk, do volunteer work, and spoil his nine grandchildren and his Greyhound.

HOLLY TREE COUNTRY CLUB

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Holly Tree Country Club's eighteen-hole golf course is laid out over rolling Foothills terrain. The course was designed by George Cobb and is a challenge from all sets of tees. The course plays 6,790 yards from the blue tees, 6,340 yards from the white tees, 5,901 yards from the grey tees, 5,01 yards from the gold tees, 5,184 yards from the red tees, and 4,812 from the black tees. Four beautiful lakes and Gilder Creek bring water into play on nine of the holes. The course features a double St. Andrews-style green serving holes 9 and 18. In addition to a driving range and putting green, Holly Tree Country Club also offers a separate chipping area and a short course practice area ideal for players of all ages and skill levels wishing to work on their game.

Ellen Featherstone, our club's first recipient of the Rotary "Service above Self" Scholarship, spoke at the last Rotary Club of Greenville meeting about her plans after graduation from Clemson University. Ellen will graduate from Clemson University on May 11th at 2:30 p.m. After graduation, she will be going to Malawi (Africa) for 27 months to serve as a Health Extension Volunteer with Peace Corps Malawi.

To celebrate Ellen's graduation, we want to provide her with funds for a special project or projects which she chooses for the Malawi village in which she will be working. Three-quarters of Malawians live below the international poverty line, surviving on less than \$1.25 per day. The funds will be presented to Ellen as a graduation gift to support her continued commitment to "Service above Self."

Service Above Self Scholarship

Excerpts from an Address to the Club

A Season of Lasts

I come to you today in a season of "Lasts". I am in my "Last" semester at Clemson University, I am attending my "Last" spring football game this Saturday, and I am speaking to the Rotary Club of Greenville for the "Last" time.

It's strange to think that only four years ago, I stood at this podium to accept the first Rotary "Service Above Self" Scholarship. This was not an accolade I felt I had earned, and to be honest it was not an award that I truly understood. But I can say with confidence, now more than ever, that over my years at Clemson I have come to understand that service is so much more than a simple definition. Service is a lifestyle, service is love, and the potential for service is in each of us. It is because of my experiences and the influence of many mentors that I now know what service and more specifically servant leadership mean.

For those of you who are not already aware, following graduation, I have accepted a position as a Health Extension Volunteer with Peace Corps Malawi. After departing June 2nd, I will be serving for 27 months abroad. During this time, I will be working under the President's Malaria Initiative and the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief. I am thrilled to be able to serve in the global health sector, and cannot wait to use my degree to help the community I will be living in.

For those of you wanting a little bit of background, Malawi is a small landlocked country in Southeast Africa bordering Zambia, Tanzania, and Mozambique. It is affectionately referred to as the "Warm Heart of Africa" due to the generosity and kindness of the people who live there. Malawi experiences high rates of poverty. Over 90% of the population survives on subsistence agriculture living under \$2 per day, and 47% of children under the age of 5 experience growth stunts related to malnutrition. Over 10% of the population is suffering from AIDS/HIV. Despite progress, Malaria continues to be a major public health problem. The disease accounts for 40% of hospitalizations in children under 5, 30% of all outpatient visits, and is one of the major causes of mortality across all age groups.

I am not ignorant that this opportunity to serve comes with challenges. But if there is one thing that I have learned since coming to college, it is that the greatest of gifts can come from the most challenging of times.

There were challenges when I worked at a summer camp for people with disabilities: A place where I taught art to the blind, learned to talk through smiles, and learned the true meaning of hope. A place where I began to question if I was making a difference, or if others were strictly making a difference in me. A place where for the first time in my life I woke up in the morning with the sole purpose of serving others instead of myself.

Ellen continued to discuss challenges she faced while in college. She ended her presentation with the following:

"I want to thank each and every one of you for the investment that you've made in my education. The Rotary "Service Above Self" Scholarship has meant the world to me. It has allowed me to place service as a focal point in my college career and to truly learn what it means to place Service above Self."


