# Addressing the *Opioid Epidemic* in the United States and Greenville, SC Rich Jones, MA, MBA, LCAS, CCS, CCDP, CAI

The opioid crisis has been described as the single greatest drug epidemic in the history of the world. 65,000 people die per year of drug overdose. 45,000 of them as a direct result of opioid overdose. Overdose is the leading cause of death for people under the age of 50 and overdose has lead to a reduction in life expectancy for Americans 2 years in a row. This presentation will provide an overview of the opioid epidemic. The history and how we got here and the impact to society. We will also discuss treatment and recovery options available to those in need. Finally, we will explore some innovative programs and promising practices that provide hope in arresting the epidemic.

**Rich Jones** is the CEO/COO for **FAVOR Greenville** offers new hope to individuals and families suffering with substance use disorders. Rich brings skills across multiple domains, including mental health services, substance use disorder treatment, and recovery support services. Prior to joining FAVOR, Rich was the Director of Community Recovery Residences for Western North Carolina and Upstate South Carolina for Pavillon Treatment Center. He received his B.S. in Business Management at St. Vincent College, his MA in Sociology with concentration in Addiction Studies at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, and his MBA with a concentration in Healthcare Management at the University of Scranton.

## Rotary Update - Service Above Self Scholar

#### Ellen Featherstone - The Rotary Club of Greenville's first "Service Above Self Scholar

**Malawi is beautiful!** There is still so much of it that I have yet to see. I currently live in a rural village called *Chinguwo in the Kasungu District*. I live with the most wonderful host family. They speak no English, but my Chichewa has gotten much better as a result. I have four younger "brothers" whom I absolutely love. My middle brother's name is Mofati, and my youngest brother is named Yanko! (See picture)

In two weeks I will be placed in my site for the next two years. I will live in the town of Ngabu in the Chikwawa District. It is the hottest area in all of Malawi. Previous volunteers claim that on the hottest day it can reach 125F. I'm not sure if this is true, but I do know it will be around 115F for the entire month of October.

I currently live with no electricity and no running water in a mud brick home. I wake up at 5 every morning to help my "Mom" with chores. She gets up even earlier. We draw water at the borehole every morning and carry it on our heads. We take bucket baths, cook on a wood fueled fire for every meal, and milk cows every morning. We also sweep. The dust here is crazy.

I don't have access to internet where I am now, but I can usually receive WhatsApp messages fairly well. I pretty much eat the same thing for lunch and dinner every day: nsima (a congealed grit patty) and mpiru (mustard greens cooked in oil) with either eggs/dried fish/chicken. I like the food, however.

Chikwawa District is known to have some of the highest number of Malaria cases, HIV/AIDS patients, and malnutrition cases in the country. The area is also endemic to cholera. Because of the large cattle herds, there are also some cases of trypanosomiasis (my undergrad research). I am very excited to start developing relationships within my community and to start identifying projects of interest. (contd.)

I am growing and learning so much every day. I also now have a new understanding of what it means to be an American. 


But are you sharing your Rotary story? Have you invited your friends and colleagues to our Rotary Club?

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Holly Tree Country Club's eighteen-hole golf course is laid out over rolling Foothills terrain. The course was designed by George Cobb and is a challenge from all sets of tees. The course plays 6,790 yards from the blue tees, 6,340 yards from the white tees, 5,901 yards from the grey tees, 5,01 yards from the gold tees, 5,184 yards from the red tees, and 4,812 from the black tees. Four beautiful lakes and Gilder Creek bring water into play on nine of the holes. The course features a double St. Andrews-style green serving holes 9 and 18. In addition to a driving range and putting green, Holly Tree Country Club also offers a separate chipping area and a short course practice area ideal for players of all ages and skill levels wishing to work on their game.
