He serves on the boards of Education Reimagined, which offers a new vision of the future of education and the Learning Policy Institute, a non-partisan think tank aimed at supplying objective research to underpin policy decisions. He also serves on the SXSWedu, Asia Society and the National Afterschool Association advisory boards.



Greenville Rotary to sponsor 2019 Peace Conference

The Rotary Club of Greenville will present the 2019 Peace and Conflict Resolution Conference on Friday, May 3, 2019 from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Greenville Convention Center (formerly TD Convention Center). The mission of the 2019 Peace Conference is to inspire people to resolve conflict in a peaceful and productive manner. As Rotarians, we refuse to accept unresolved conflict as a way of life.

Keynote speakers are highlighted below.

BAWA JAIN will open the conference with a presentation on "Is Peace Possible?" Bawa is Founding Secretary General of the World Council of Reli-

gious Leaders and is founder of the World Movement of Nonviolence. He actively speaks, practices, and promotes Religious Diplomacy around the world as part of his broader thrust on Responsible Leadership.

AZIM KHA-

MISA'S son, Tariq, 20 was killed by a 14-year-old gang

member in a gang initiation ritual. Since then, Azim has authored four books and speaks worldwide to students and adults on nonviolence, forgiveness and peace-building. Azim will speak on "Forgiveness as the Foundation of Peace" and on his journey to becoming a passionate peace activist and a teacher of nonviolence and forgiveness.

DAVID FORWARD will discuss his latest book *A String of Pearls: Inspiring Stories of How Rotary Peace Fellows Are Serving Humanity and Saving the World.* This book honors Peace Fellows by telling their stories. David says, "Like a pearl, which starts out as a minute grain of sand and over time develops through many crystalline layers into a precious jewel, our scholars are a force for good in the world that is rare, valuable, and prized. The Rotary Peace Fellows are a string of pearls."

JESSICA SHRYACK will lead a session titled, "Living Room Conversations: An experimental session in civil discourse." Jessica facilitates face-to-face conversations between people with differing views and experiences, especially around difficult topics. Skills participants will learn include active listening and using ground rules to set the stage for effective conversation. The goal of these conversations is to try to see other points of view by pushing through stereotypes and emotion while not getting so "triggered" that we lose the opportunity to engage others.

An **INTERFAITH PANEL** will feature representatives from Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, Catholicism, and Christianity religions. Although all religions have distinct belief systems, there are similarities and common goals of peace, love, and justice. The goal of the panel presentation is to inspire others to understand "we" are all in this world together and that

> harmony begins with each of us, regardless of our religious affiliation.

Police Board of Inquiry. D.F. spent three months at Chulalongkorn University in Thailand as a Rotary Peace Scholar where he earned a professional certificate in Peace and Conflict Studies. He will speak on how he took the lessons of the Rotary Peace Program to the streets of Philadelphia and how that training has influenced and been applied throughout his career in law enforcement.

VIKAS SRIVASTAVA will speak on "Transforming Violence." He will offer ideas to transform the past into a non-violent future by redefining the essence of violence — including a strategy to end the cycle of violence while healing the past and preventing similar violence from reigniting.

Sponsorships are available. The planning committee asks that 99 Rotarians become Champions of Peace by making a \$99 Pledge for Peace. There are five levels of investment in the 2019 Peace and Conflict Resolution Conference, and net proceeds from the conference will go toward funding a Rotary Peace Scholar.
